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Planning Your Presentation

1. Determine type of presentation

• What is your goal?

2. Select Topic – Area of expertize/high level of knowledge and/or interest

- If you're not interested in the topic, your audience won't be either.
- 3. Research your topic to help narrow your focus, if needed.
 - Use credible resources, such as WCCC Library databases & journal articles, etc.

Planning Your Presentation (continued)

4. Collect/compile data (if applicable)

- CAUTION: Data overload can overwhelm your audience!
- 5. Compile references for citations and reference page.
- 6. Create an outline of key points to be made.
 - This will organize your information.
 - Make it easier to create power point slides

7. Consult Rubric provided by Professor, (if available) regarding specific guidelines for project to ensure inclusion of required info.

During Your Presentation

DO...

- ► Smile ☺
- Engage & face your audience
- Speak loud & clearly
- Maintain eye contact
- Use props (if appropriate) & visual aids
- Use notecards to keep you on track

Don't...

- Merely read your presentation notes
- Ignore your audience
- Mumble or Rush
- Neglect to test technology prior
- Focus on mistakes
- ► Forget to breathe... ☺
